Religious Education



Twenty-Ninth Sunday, Year A

Matthew 22:34-40 Loving one another, without exception

The Pharisees continue to test Jesus with a question about the greatest commandment. This week's Gospel follows close behind the Gospel read last Sunday. It is the last of three questions put to Jesus by Jewish religious leaders who are trying to trick him into saying something that might get him arrested. This reminds us that the context for today's reading is the mounting tension between Jesus and the religious leaders in Jerusalem.

Jesus answers the Pharisees' question with a two-fold summary. Jesus says that all of the commandments can be summarized in two commandments: love God and love your neighbour. Both of these were central elements of the religious tradition Jesus learned from his Jewish community. Indeed these continue to be central aspects of contemporary Jewish religious understanding. Jesus' response to his questioners proposed an integral connection between these two aspects of the Jewish Law. Love of God finds its expression in our love for our neighbour.

World Mission Month

Catholic Mission is the official mission aid agency of the Catholic Church. We reach out, give life and call all people in the world to faith, justice and love. Missionary activity is, fundamentally, a going out of oneself in love, a reaching out to bring God's love to everyone, especially the outcast and unloved. Jesus' mission of creating a world where all can live a fully dignified life is still far from completion. The theme of this year's Catholic Mission World Mission Appeal, 'When I grow up I want to be alive', is inspired by Ephesians 2:4-6, 'God who is rich in mercy... made us alive'.

Jamaica is a nation deeply troubled by violence and crime. With the second-highest rate of gun-killings anywhere in the world*, communities live in constant fear. To just be alive might seem like a simple dream to us, but for many of the Jamaican youth born into the ghettos, they know chances are high that they will never achieve their dreams or that their life will be cut short as a result of

the violence. During this term our students' understanding of 'mission' and 'missionaries' will be nurtured through our 'Sharing Our Story' units of work and that students will be encouraged and supported to live as Christ challenges us.

St Jude's Week Helping Hands Make a Difference!

Last term, a group of children were looking at globalisation in HSIE. We researched how world organisations can improve people's lives. Then we learned how ONE person can make a difference, this person was Gemma Rice. After doing volunteer work in Africa, she began her journey to educate the disadvantaged students in Tanzania. We would also like to make a difference, by supporting Gemma in her ultimate goal of "Fighting poverty through education." During Week 4, from Monday to Friday, we will be holding special events to raise money and awareness for the St Jude's Foundation. Some events include: Selfie Competition (Mon-Wed), Powers of Estimation/Lolly Jar(Mon-Wed), Guess that Baby (Tues), Pick the Hit (Wed), Bullseye (Thurs), Movies, Magic and More (Fri), Draw with your hands, to help with your hands (Mon). Assessment Strategies

Teachers employ a variety of assessment strategies. One of the initial strategies is by Observation. Teachers are able to gauge the children's levels of understandings through observation of their practices and behaviours when undertaking a task. Checklists and anecdotal records help in the recording of these observations. Anecdotal records are a more informal form of assessment where the teacher takes observational notes on a student's achievements, beliefs, attitudes and skills as they are engaged in a task. Questioning is another form of assessment and can be either written or oral. Higher order questions indicate not only facts retained by the student but also if the student is able to apply the known facts. Open ended questioning allows for more than one answer to a problem and involves thinking beyond facts or skills. Another assessment strategy widely used by teachers is Testing. Diagnostic tests assess specific concepts through written or oral questioning. They are used to diagnose areas of difficulty so that suitable teaching can take place. Performance based testing involves a practical test where the teacher assesses the student as they are involved in an activity. Pen and paper tests are used to assess skills and facts recently taught and are designed to assess a variety of outcomes. Multiple choice tests are generally included in more formal tests such as the NAPLAN test completed by the Years 3 and 5 students. Problem solving requires the student to reach a solution to a problem without the need to use a normal procedure or algorithm. Finally, teachers often ask the students to self reflect on their learning by recording their thoughts and experiences. This and other forms of self evaluation help the teacher to understand how a child feels about their learning and any difficulties they may be experiencing.
